## Psalm 91:5-10

<sup>6</sup> nor the pestilence that stalks in darkness, nor the destruction that wastes at noonday.

<sup>7</sup> A thousand may fall at your side,

ten thousand at your right hand, but it will not come near you. <sup>8</sup> You will only look with your eyes and see the recompense of the wicked.

<sup>9</sup> Because you have made the LORD your dwelling place—the Most High, who is my refuge—
<sup>10</sup> no evil shall be allowed to befall you, no plague come near your tent. (ESV)
