55 "O death, where is your victory?

⁵⁶ The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. ⁵⁷ But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Corinthians 15:51-57 ESV)

As Paul writes, we may not die, but we will all be changed. That will be at the time when Jesus returns. Paul says this, because there is the possibility that some of us won't die before Jesus returns.
